2019 has been an important year, the culmination of our first five as Challenge Seattle. When we first set out on this journey in 2015, we dedicated Challenge Seattle to providing civic leadership in partnership with others to address challenges to a future we all want. While much remains to be done, I can confidently say that we have made significant progress in the last five years, and I am proud of our accomplishments.

Over the past 12 months alone, we have made good progress. We took on a new challenge, the lack of affordable housing for our region's middle-income families and individuals, and transformed what was once an invisible crisis into a statewide conversation. We have an exciting vision for the future of the Cascadia Innovation Corridor, which will be made possible by our work to bring together our mega-region's world class organizations and experts.

Our education programs continue to scale their impact. Our Career Discovery Tours reached over 2,000 students in 2019. We are bringing our teacher externship program to scale with other employers, and our newest program is empowering our region's high school principals to grow as leaders and support one another in their complex, critical role. The Global Innovation Exchange has advanced to the point that we are implementing GIX 2.0, an aggressive new plan developed with the Boston Consulting Group to take GIX to a new level.

Our transportation programs continue to re-imagine mobility for our region. The Mobility Innovation Center is bringing together the public and private sectors to partner on projects that will re-define how we interact with our transportation system. This year, we researched re-allocating curb space to improve pedestrian safety and reduce congestion, and are re-defining how public agencies work together virtually to address traffic incidents and keep the public moving.

Following our work to launch Greater Seattle Partners, we have been proud to watch its successful first year as the first--and long overdue--organization dedicated to regional economic development.

2020 marks the start of our next five years. We are excited to continue to take on some of the greatest challenges facing our region. Thank you for your enthusiasm, support, and most of all, leadership over five impactful years.

In 2018, we transferred the latter two programs to an organization we helped create that is dedicated to regional economic development: Greater Seattle Partners. That same year we added two new programs: Cascadia Innovation Corridor and Affordable Middle-Income Housing. In 2019, we continued to scale the impact of our two original programs, made significant progress building our two new programs, and celebrated five years of success, all while looking ahead to five more years of civic leadership.



In 2015, our region faced a projected shortfall of 49,000 skilled workers by 2020. In response, Challenge Seattle set to work to support our region's educators in shaping a world-class workforce right here at home. In K-12 education, we took a unique, comprehensive approach. Our members gave their time, invested their energy, and opened their doors to students, teachers, and principals from around our region. Today, those programs reach thousands of students every year, and our work to take them to scale has just begun.


In higher education, we partnered with the University of Washington and Tsinghua University in Beijing to develop a new, modern approach to graduate studies: the Global Innovation Exchange. Working in teams on project-based curriculum, students solve real-world challenges with global implications. In 2019, Challenge Seattle partnered with the Boston Consulting Group to create GIX 2.0, a plan that will build on the program's successful start-up phase and take it to the next level.

SPOTLIGHT ON: THE CEO PROJECT

2019 marked the first full calendar year of our program supporting high school principals: The CEO Project.

A partnership between Challenge Seattle, the Association of Washington School Principals, and Washington Roundtable, The CEO Project aims to improve principal retention by providing professional development and networking opportunities to high school principals from around our region. Participating principals spend two years together, gathering for two-day leadership training sessions and building a network of support. Each principal is also paired with a senior business executive, creating bonds between the private sector and our schools while providing leadership lessons that span industry boundaries.

In partnership with transportation leaders, Challenge Seattle brings stakeholders together to think creatively and take action to solve our region's transportation challenges. Leading by example, Challenge Seattle members are committed to reducing their own impacts on the system by radically shifting how their employees get to work. In partnership with the University of Washington, Challenge Seattle established the Mobility Innovation Center (MIC), which brings together the resources and expertise of the public, private, and academic sectors to create new innovations to our regional transportation system.

The MIC's work has propelled our region to embrace cutting edge technology to solve transportation challenges -- from deploying drones to quickly clear incidents to building a Virtual Command Center that harnesses cloud technology to enable data-driven, regional management of our transportation system.

THE VIRTUAL COMMAND CENTER: RE-DEFINING INCIDENT RESPONSE

The Virtual Command Center project has brought together 7 public agencies to re-define their shared response to traffic incidents. The Center will pull real-time data from all 7 agencies into a common dashboard, allowing responders across agencies to see incidents as they happen, make more informed, coordinated response decisions, and deliver a unified public message. The public will receive information not just about the incident itself, but how it is impacting the rest of the system and what alternative routes will get them to their destination safely and efficiently.


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ULTRA HIGH-SPEED TRANSPORTATION: RE-IMAGINING MOBILITY IN THE REGION

Ultra high-speed transportation (UHST) has the potential not only to transform how we move about the region, but also to offer innovative solutions to housing affordability and internet connectivity challenges in our communities. That is why Microsoft, Washington, Oregon, and British Columbia have all invested in a feasibility study to understand the full benefits UHST would offer our region. Phase I of that study has already been completed, and the results were staggering: 200,000 jobs and \$355 billion in estimated economic growth for our region as a direct result of UHST. Phase II of the study is set to be completed by the end of 2020.

INVESTING IN THE FUTURE OF MOBILITY

The future of our region's transportation system impacts all of us, which is why the Mobility Innovation Center continues to attract increasing support from across all sectors.

SPOTLIGHT ON: STUDYING SAFETY AT THE CURB

The Mobility Innovation Center released the results of a pilot study co-funded by Seattle DOT, Sound Transit, King County Metro, and Amazon. The study investigated options for supporting easier and less disruptive passenger pick-ups and drop-offs for ride-hail app vehicles like Uber and Lyft. Researchers tested the traffic impacts of providing more passenger loading zones paired with in-app geofencing technology that guided drivers and riders to designated load/unload locations. The results indicate that creating a designated space for passenger loading can discourage double-parking and reduce traffic conflicts. A second phase of the study has also received public and private funding and is set to begin in 2020.

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PUBLIC & PRIVATE INSTITUTIONS PARTNERING TO IMPROVE THE SAFETY AND EFFICIENCY OF OUR CITY STREETS

MIDDLE-INCOME HOUSING AFFORDABILITY

In June 2018, the Challenge Seattle CEOs discussed the housing crisis in the region and its impacts on our community, economy, and quality of life. Recognizing the significant attention and resources already being dedicated to address the housing challenges facing homeless and low-income populations, they asked what efforts were underway to address how the crisis was affecting middle-income households. This question led to the creation of Challenge Seattle's newest program: Middle-Income Housing Affordability.

We researched how this crisis is being confronted on the local, national, and international stages. We learned that it has yet to be successfully addressed anywhere in the world, and, importantly, that the impacts reach beyond the middle-income population. A shortage of affordable middle-income housing hurts households further down the income scale. We partnered with the Boston Consulting Group to raise awareness within our own region, leading to our report issued in January 2019 entitled "The Invisible Crisis: A Call to Action on Middle-Income Housing Affordability."

"PRICED OUT": THE INVISIBLE CRISIS BY THE NUMBERS

Today, a middle-income family cannot afford to buy a median-priced home in King County. For example, a registered nurse earning \$80,000 per year was "priced out" of the area in 2014. The trend continues to hit city after city: 2013 was the last year a nurse could afford to buy a house in Seattle; in 2017, Renton became too expensive. Of course, nurses are just one example of the many middle-income jobs affected by this crisis. Teachers, firefighters, electricians, paramedics, construction workers, and many more are also impacted.

CHALLENGE SEATTLE TAKES ACTION

In January 2019, Challenge Seattle, in partnership with the Boston Consulting Group, issued "The Invisible Crisis: A Call to Action on Middle-Income Housing Affordability." This report focused on the much-felt but little-noticed toll the housing affordability crisis is having on middle-income households, and its implications for lowincome and homeless members of our communities as well.

Our work has spurred huge progress already. We have raised the bar for private-sector investment in housing and have united the elected leadership of our cities. Microsoft announced an unprecedented commitment of \$500M to address housing affordability, \$225M of which was committed to middle-income housing. We also established a unique, public-private partnership starting with 9 King County Mayors. We have since welcomed all King County mayors to the partnership, as well as the King County Labor Council (MLK Labor) and leading housing developers. We continue to engage with funders, non-profits, financial institutions, and others to join the public-private partnership needed to tackle this issue. CASCADIA INNOVATION

Mega-regions, which connect networks of major cities, are widely understood to be the new units of competition in the global economy. About 40 mega-regions exist worldwide. The 11 mega-regions located within the U.S. represent more than 70% of the nation's population and jobs. Cascadia, which connects Portland, OR, Seattle, WA, and Vancouver, B.C., has long been recognized as a mega-region, but was organizationally inactive until 2016. That year, a renewed effort began, starting with identifying the similarities, opportunities, and challenges shared by Cascadia's three major cities. In 2018, Challenge Seattle assumed the role of co-chair of the effort to more deeply connect this mega-region. Together with our partner, the Business Council of British Columbia, we have since established a distinguished Steering Committee comprised of experts from throughout the region. These experts chair seven sub-committees, each focused on an area of shared strength and strategic importance for the mega-region.
